EAH, ELLEN came out on prime time, but did she have a traditional Jewish lesbian wedding? In this long-overdue encore run of her outstanding autobiographical 1995 performance piece June Bride (directed this time around by Jayne Wegner), the multitalented Sara Felder turns the experience of her wedding into a joyous, beautiful, and insightful meditation on both the frustrating limits and the inspiring possibilities of tradition and ritual. Felder is an expert at performing identity through metaphor - tossing knives while contemplating circumcision, escaping from a straitjacket while detailing her coming out, and in the piece's overarching motif, juggling just about anything while thinking out loud about being a Jew and a lesbian. June Bride's slice of queer Talmudic vaudeville avoids being simply another welcome voice in the gay-marriage debate; it's a rare, original, and unforgettable celebration of love, faith, and the often hilarious art of juggling all that we are.
